

## Treasure Hunt in Baeza

Get into international teams of 4 or 5. The first team accomplishing these tasks by showing all the photos will be the winner.

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### 1. Plaza del Populo (Square of the Populus). The square is guarded by the Lion's fountain.

- Find the statue of the Iberian princess Imilce (daughter of the King of Castulo and wife of Carthaginian general Anibal Barca), and take a selfie beside her!

**2. The Old Abattoir (slaughter house):** It was built in the 16th century, although in another location. It was dismantled and transferred, stone by stone, to the Plaza del Pópulo in the middle of the 20th century. As it did not fit in its present location, the building had to be adapted to it.

- Take a photo showing evidence that the facade was adapted to fit in its present location.

**3. The Arch of Villalar:** The Arch of Villalar is made in ashlar stone forming a pointed arch. It was built by the town to commemorate the victory of King Charles V in the Communities War (Comuneros), in 1521. Next to it is located the Jaén Gate, which was rebuilt in 1526 to commemorate the visit to the city of Emperor Charles V after his marriage to Isabel of Portugal. It was decorated with the imperial shield.

- Get a group photo under the Arch of Villalar.

**4. Jabalquinto Palace:** The construction of this palace was commanded by Juan Alfonso de Benavides, second cousin of Ferdinand the Catholic, in the late 15th century. The façade is Isabelline Gothic and it is adorned with diamond mouldings, pineapple flowers, fleurons, ribbons, pinnacles, honeycomb work and eight Flemish-style coats of arms (inclined) with helmets, crests and acanthus leaves.

- Take a photo of the 14 human figures on the façade.

**5. Iglesia de la Santa Cruz:** Romanesque, an unusual rarity in the middle of Andalusia, built in the 13th century, after the conquest of the Upper Valley of the Guadalquivir by Fernando III (capitulation of Baeza in 1227). The west facade comes from the ruins of the church of San Juan.

- Take a photo of your group under the most outstanding feature of this church.

**6. Antonio Machado' classroom:** This classroom in the secondary school located in the Old University, where the poet Antonio Machado taught French from October 1912 to November 1919, has been preserved with the same furniture of the time.

- Take a group photo of the teacher's table with brazier.

**7. Fuente de Santa Maria:** This fountain commemorated the bringing of waters to Baeza, in 1564. It is decorated with the shields of Felipe II and five medallions with inscriptions.

- Take a selfie which can show your team under the Imperial coat of arms.

**8. Seminary of Saint Philip Neri:** The 17th Century Seminary of San Felipe Neri is now part of the International University of Andalusia. It was a tradition that, upon graduation, students would use bull's blood to inscribe graffiti (Victor) on the walls of the Seminary

- Find the blood graffiti of the student doing his daily duty at the toilet, and take a photo.

**9. Cathedral of Our Lady of the Nativity:** Baeza was the first town in Andalusia to have a cathedral. This is probably due to the fact that Ferdinand III took Baeza back from the Moors in 1227, one of his first conquests. The cathedral was largely rebuilt by Andrés de Vandelvira, architect of Jaén's cathedral, between 1570 and 1593, though the west front has architectural influences from an earlier period.

- Take a photo of the 14th-century rose window crowning the 13th Century Puerta de la Luna (Moon Door).
